FIGURE 9.4 Flowchart for Evaluating Your Paragraphs


QUESTIONS

1. Does each paragraph have a clear topic sentence that supports the thesis? <u>Underline</u> the topic sentence in each paragraph. Then evaluate whether the topic sentence makes a statement that supports the main idea of the essay.



REVISION STRATEGIES

• Revise a sentence within the paragraph so that it clearly states the main point.





Do all sentences in each paragraph support the topic sentence? To find out, read the topic sentence and each supporting sentence in turn.



- Revise supporting sentences to make their connection to the topic sentence clear.
- Delete any sentences that do not support the topic sentence.



3. Does the paragraph offer adequate explanation and supporting details? Place
✓ s beside supporting details. Then ask yourself: Will readers want or need to know anything else?



- Add more details if your paragraph seems skimpy.
- Use either the who, what, when, where, why, and how questions or the prewriting strategies in Chapter 5 to generate the details you need.



4. Will it be clear to your reader how each sentence and each paragraph connects to those before and after it? (To find out, read your paper aloud to see if it flows smoothly or sounds choppy.)
